
## Health economics

### MSc dissertation distinctions

Hearty congratulations to Analisa Conway and Georgia Davidson and who were awarded distinctions for their MSc dissertations.

Analisa included qualitative interview data from ASSIST and SEQUENCE digital in her exploration of the evidence base for using trauma-informed care in online sexual and reproductive health services. She found traumainformed care approaches vary in and between clinicbased and online services.

Georgia analysed the demographic characteristics of people testing for Hepatitis C in central and northwest London. She found differences between those who tested in clinic and using OPSS, and is currently writing up her findings for publication.

# Update on analyses

We are analysing our extensive qualitative dataset, incorporating over 150 interviews, detailed observation field notes and a range of documents. We are liaising with sites to make final adjustments to our quantitative datasets and developing our analyses. Details to follow!













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
